When I built my home in 1999, it was intended to be a retreat where I could retire to meditate amidst the trees and rocks in the peace and solitude of this area of Yellow Point. People came at no charge for meditation, solitude and privacy; some stayed for several days.

One neighbour had an existing house at the end of my driveway which was not visible from my house. Another neighbour built on the adjoining property to me, but their home cannot be seen from my home. Some day I knew a house would be built on the property opposite me on Graham Road where the Timmermans are now building.

Early in his building, Mr. Timmermans spoke to me regarding hydro poles on the road allowance on my side of Graham Road. We walked down Graham Road and he showed me where they would be located. I said I would prefer they not be there and he said that was OK with him. I see now that hydro is going to place them on my side of Graham Road. Rather than cut down trees on Mr. Timmermans property, I am agreeable to have the poles on my side of Graham Road. Incidentally, this will make a total of five hydro poles on my five acres.

When the first Board of Variance notice was mailed to me, I was concerned, but decided to agree to the additional height. When the second notice was received, I spoke to an architect who informed me



that the Timmerman's house would be very much in view of my home and especially since the left elevation would be the side facing my home. This left elevation is the front entrance, which also appears to have a large deck. People coming and going as well as sitting on the front deck both for themselves and for entertaining will definitely affect the privacy and solitude of my location.

Last Monday, while walking my dogs, Mr. Timmermans drove by and I spoke to him regarding my concerns. He assured me that I would have nothing to worry about as he planned to plant poplars along that side of the house and to use his words "I would not be able to see the house."

I am new to this type of process and have never done this before and therefore I am appealing to the Board for direction. I am concerned about the lack of privacy. I am prepared to agree to the additional height if Mr. Timmermans will agree in writing, to his proposal of planting a landscape barrier of substantial trees with enough height and mass to obscure the front door and deck which will give me the privacy to which I am accustomed.

Please do not hesitate to call me if you require any additional information.



REGIONAL GROWTH STRATEGY BYLAW 1309

BYLAW REFERRAL STATUS

PURPOSE

To receive the responses to the Regional District of Nanaimo referral of "Regional District of Nanaimo Regional Growth Strategy Bylaw No. 1309".

BACKGROUND

The Regional District of Nanaimo has received responses to its September 13, 2002 referral of "Regional" District of Nanaimo Regional Growth Strategy Bylaw No. 1309" to the Cities of Nanaimo and Parksville, the Town of Qualicum Beach, Comox-Strathcona Regional District, Alberni Clayquot Regional District and Cowichan Valley Regional District, pursuant to Section 857 of the Local Government Act.

Referral agencies are required to review the Bylaw in the context of any official community plans and regional growth strategies for their jurisdictions and in the context of any other matters that affect the jurisdiction, and to either accept or refuse the Bylaw. Should the jurisdiction refuse the Bylaw it must identify by resolution each provision of the Bylaw to which it objects, the reasons for its objection, and whether it is willing that a provision to which it objects be included in the Bylaw on the basis that the provision will not apply to the jurisdiction.

Responses to the teferral are provided for the Board's information (see Attachments 1-6). The following table summarizes the referral responses.

The Bylaw was also referred to Honourable George Abbott, the Minister of Community, Aboriginal and Women's Services, as required, on September 13, 2002. The Minister's acceptance of the Bylaw is not required. The Minister's acknowledgement of this referral and recognition of the work to develop the Bylaw is attached (see Attachment 7).

On October 8, 2002 the Board rescinded first and second reading of the Bylaw and referred it back to staff to allow for further public consultation. Since the Bylaw no longer exists the results of the referral can only be received.

Given the Board's direction, staff will be preparing Terms of Reference and a Consultation Plan for the completion of the Growth Management Plan Review for the Board's consideration of approval in January of 2003. The objective of the completion of the Growth Management Plan Review is for the Board to decide what changes, if any, should be made to "Regional District of Nanaimo Growth Management Plan Bylaw No. 985.01". Provision will also be made to address the issues identified by the above-noted jurisdictions in the completion process. The Board will need to complete all of the steps required to change a regional growth strategy bylaw, including giving a new bylaw 1st and 2st reading, conducting a public hearing and referring the bylaw to the three member municipalities and three adjacent regional districts for consideration of acceptance. Until such time as a new regional growth strategy bylaw is adopted "Regional District of Nanaimo Growth Management Plan Bylaw No. 985.01" remains the regional growth strategy for the region.

Gabriola Island - Emergency Wharf Proposal

PURPOSE

To provide for funding for a water lot lease application and associated engineering to assist with the proposed establishment of a new emergency wharf function for Gabriola Island.

BACKGROUND

A number of concerned citizens and associations on Gabriola Island have been working together to develop a medical evacuation system to serve Islanders when the BC Ferries system is not in operation. Currently there is no reliable, long-term system in place that would ensure that people requiring offisland medical care could be transferred to Nanaimo Regional General Hospital.

The group has concluded that the development of a Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN) wharf function for this purpose alone, combined with a form of contracted service provision (by others) for any marine transfers would provide the best long-term solution. The first step in establishing such a facility would be the acquisition of a water lot license to accommodate the proposed wharf, ramp and associated shoreline works.

The proposed location for this facility is adjacent to the existing BC Ferry dock at Descanso Bay. The location works well with respect to access, parking, lighting and related facilities. In order to process an application for a water lot license the wharf size, its orientation and any associated works such as tie backs etc. would have to be clearly defined. To do so will require professional assistance.

In order to retain the professional assistance, required funds from the Feasibility Fund must be accessed, as the proposal would require the establishment of a new local service for the electoral area. It is not possible to utilize funds from any of the other existing functions that provide services to the Island. Preliminary discussions with service providers in this industry suggest that costs could reach up to \$7,000 for the provision of assistance in making application for a water lot license and for the engineering involved for the design of the facility.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve the release of Feasibility funds of up to \$7,000.
- Do not approve the release of Feasibility Funds.



FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The General Administration Feasibility Fund has funds available up to \$7,000 that could be used for this project. Should the proposed function be established these funds would be reimbursed. The engineering carried out with these funds will establish the capital and operating costs for the proposed facility which will be brought forward as part of a separate report on the establishment of a new wharf service.

CITIZEN IMPLICATIONS

A number of concerned citizens and associations on Gabriola Island are eager to establish a reliable method of transporting medical emergencies off the Island.

The establishment of this function, through the adoption of the appropriate bylaws, will require electorate consent gained either through counter petition or referendum.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

Concerned residents and associations on Gabriola Island wish to establish a permanent wharf facility for medical evacuations. Located at Descanso Bay adjacent to the existing BC Ferries dock, this facility would provide for safe, reliable transfers of medical evacuees from the Ambulance Service to a contracted marine transport service.

To facilitate the establishment of this wharf RDN staff have been asked to proceed with the application for the wharf and associated water lot lease. To assist staff in this activity a service provider familiar with such applications and in the design of wharfs and associated works will be required at an estimated cost not to exceed \$7,000.

RECOMMENDATION

That up to \$7,000 be utilized from the General Administration Feasibility Fund for a water lot lease application and associated engineering services related to the establishment of a new local service function for an emergency wharf at Descanso Bay, Gabriola Island.



PURPOSE

To consider Northern Community Sewer Local Service Area Development Cost Charge Expenditure Bylaw No.1328, 2002 for the installation of higher capacity pumps for the French Creek Pollution Control Centre.

BACKGROUND

Higher capacity pumps are required at the Bay Avenue pumping station and the trickling filter to accommodate higher flows. They were identified as DCC projects in the 2002 budget with an estimated project cost of \$164,000. Detailed engineering has now been completed and it is estimated that \$200,000 will be required to complete these projects.

A Development Cost Charge expenditure Bylaw is required to release these funds.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. That the "Northern Community Sewer Local Service Area Development Cost Charge Expenditure Bylaw No.1328, 2002" be introduced, given three readings and adopted.
- 2. That the Development Cost Charge Expenditure Bylaw proceed for \$164,000 and that the additional \$36,000 be funded by a tax increase to the Northern Community Sewer Local Service Area.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Alternative 1

Construction Moratorium for the French Creek Water Local Service Area

(Chartwell & Sandpiper Subdivisions)

PURPOSE

To provide further information to the Board on means of implementing a construction moratorium in the Chartwell/Sandpiper area of French Creek.

BACKGROUND

In August 2002 the Committee of the Whole considered a staff report on a request from the French Creek Residents Association for a moratorium on development and construction in the Chartwell community based on concerns with water levels in the supply aquifer. Staff obtained legal advice that the authority for the Regional District to impose such a moratorium would have to be obtained from the Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC) and that sufficient information on the groundwater aquifer situation in the area was not available at this time to support a request to Cabinet. The Committee received the report and recommended, among other things, that a decision on seeking authority to impose a development moratorium be based on the results of a hydrogeological study in the Englishman River and French Creek watersheds and on a study to investigate additional water sources for the French Creek Water Local Service Area. At the September 2002 Board meeting, the Board supported undertaking the hydrogeological study and a study to acquire additional water for the FCWLSA. The Board also directed that staff meet further with legal counsel and the province to investigate means to implement a construction moratorium in the Chartwell/Sandpiper area.

Accordingly, staff met with legal counsel on this matter, who in turn conferred with staff from the Ministry of Community, Aboriginal & Women's Services (CAWS). Following is a summary of the legal and ministerial advice provided:

• Under section 799(1) of the Local Government Act, the LGIC may, by regulation, grant a power to a regional district. Pursuant to this authority, it is counsel's opinion that it is within the power of the LGIC to confer on the Regional District the authority to withhold building permits, notwithstanding that the Regional District may be under a legal duty to issue a building permit to an applicant who submits an application for construction that complies with the Building Bylaw of the Regional District.

Although the mechanism exists to acquire the authority, there is the question of whether the province would support such a grant of authority. The position of CAWS staff is that it is unlikely the province would be willing to support a request for powers to impose a development moratorium in the circumstances that exist in the Chartwell/Sandpiper area. In an extreme situation, i.e. where the consequences of not granting the power could create a serious threat to the health of residents, then the provincial interest might be strong enough to support the grant of authority.

- In this particular circumstance, however, the province's reaction to a request for the additional authority would not likely be positive since the circumstances do not indicate there is a serious threat to public health. In addition, with additional restrictions or controls on the use of water for sprinkling, there should be sufficient water available for build out of the subdivision, subject to the issue of the declining water table (which is impacted by development and water use within a much broader area, not just Chartwell).
- Further, the request for powers to impose a building permit moratorium may be perceived as granting the Regional District an extraordinary power to deny property owners a right to develop their land (as was conferred on owners of already existing development).
- If the Regional District wished to pursue this matter formally, a request could be made to the province for the authority. The request should include, among other things, a clear summary of all evidence that the Regional District has to support the declining water table, including information on the rate of decline. The insufficiency of the groundwater supply and the role of the province in contributing to development in French Creek should be explained in the request, In addition, the Regional District should consider for what period of time the power would be required and should determine precisely what additional authority it actually needs (i.e., withholding building permits, imposing water conservation measures, to what areas would the authority apply, etc.),

ALTERNATIVES

- Pursue the matter formally with the province by submitting a request for additional authority from the province to give the Regional District the power to withhold building permits within the Chartwell/Sandpiper area.
- Submit a request for additional authority to withhold building permits within the French Creek area generally, including within the Breakwater service area and other areas outside the French Creek Water Local Service Area in Electoral Areas F & G that potentially may be impacting on the water supply aquifers.
- Complete the hydrogeological study in the Englishman River and French Creek watersheds and base the decision to request the authority to impose a moratorium on the results of this study and the study to acquire an additional water source for the FCWLSA.

ANALYSIS OF ALTERNATIVES

Alternative 1 may not provide the Regional District with the necessary means to address the expressed concerns. Besides the wells serving the French Creek Water LSA, there are other water users in the area drawing from the aquifer that affect groundwater levels. A moratorium in Chartwell/Sandpiper would not address development or the installation of additional wells in other areas such as the Breakwater service area, Area F, other parts of Area G, and environs. Further, although a moratorium in Chartwell/Sandpiper would indeed serve to limit further demand on the FCWLSA system, there is potential for about an additional 50 lots to be developed in this service area, all of which are appropriately zoned and have an expectation and right to proceed with development, as did properties that have already been developed. Additionally, a request for the authority to impose a moratorium in this area would need to be supported by information on the aquifer, the declining water table and its rate of decline.

Alternative 2 would provide a broader and more effective means to address concerns regarding impacts on the French Creek and Parksville aquifers. The extent of the area that should be considered for this alternative is not known at this time due to the lack of information on the groundwater movements and aquifer interactions in the area. Additionally, as for Alternative 1, a request for the authority to impose a moratorium in this currently undefined area would need to be supported by information on the aquifer(s), the declining water table and its rate of decline.

Alternative 3 would defer submission of a request for authority but it would provide the opportunity to acquire information necessary to support a request and to defend a decision to impose development restrictions. The Board should recognize that this approach might necessitate continued periodic water use restrictions in the French Creek Water LSA, particularly if we experience periods of low precipitation.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

At the September 10, 2002 Board meeting, the Board directed that staff meet further with legal counsel and the province to investigate means to implement a construction moratorium in the Chartwell/Sandpiper subdivision. Staff met with counsel, who in turn conferred with staff from the Ministry of Community, Aboriginal & Women's Services. As previously reported, the authority for the Regional District to impose a construction moratorium may be granted by regulation by Cabinet. The province's response to such a request for Chartwell/Sandpiper may not be favourable unless it can be shown that there exists a serious threat to public health. Further, a request for such powers should include evidence to support concerns about a declining water table, including information on the rate of decline. The proposed hydrogeological study of the aquifers in the Englishman River and French Creek watersheds is expected to provide this and other valuable information that can be used to more effectively understand and manage the groundwater resource.

Water Line Looping

PURPOSE

To provide information regarding looping the water lines in the French Creek. Water Local Service Area.

BACKGROUND

The French Creek Water Local Service Area (FCWLSA) is supplied by groundwater that is high in naturally occurring iron and manganese. Iron and manganese are not a health issue but rather a nuisance in household water. Some of the nuisances caused by iron and manganese are taste and odour, suspended solids and staining of fixtures and laundry. Iron and manganese precipitate also has a tendency to concentrate in water lines, especially in areas of low flow. In the French Creek water system there are several dead-end lines in cul-de-sacs, which are areas that experience low flows. constructing dead-end water lines is acceptable practice. However, in the situation of high concentrations of iron and manganese in the supply, looping of systems may improve water quality by reducing stagnation in the lines and accumulation of precipitate.

At the September 6, 2002 Board Meeting, the Board directed staff to prepare a report on the possibility of improving water quality in the cul-de-sacs by looping the water lines. Accordingly, a cost estimate has been prepared to loop all of the existing dead-end lines in the French Creek water system in order to potentially reduce problems associated with iron and manganese buildup. Looping the water lines may improve water quality but may negatively impact fire flows. The existing dead-end lines are 200mm. 150mm and 100mm diameter and unless all 150mm and 100mm lines are removed and replaced with 200mm lines the fire flows may be compromised. The cost estimate provided does not include replacing the 150mm and 100mm lines. The looping costs are based on looping within the cul-de-sac, not through to adjacent streets, which would be more desirable but would necessitate the acquisition of Right of Ways and excavation through private property.

Staff is completing a pre-design report on the sizing, layout and cost to provide a new reservoir and distribution pumphouse and are investigating an alternative groundwater supply for the FCWLSA. The installation of a new larger reservoir will provide more retention for settlement of iron and manganese. which should improve water quality. Further, if secured, a new water supply may be of better raw water quality. These changes alone may improve water quality without looping the watermains.

- 2. Proceed with looping the existing water lines.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The cost for looping all of the dead-end lines in French Creek is estimated at \$271,178, which is \$437 per parcel. The number of dead-end lines in Chartwell is significantly higher than the number of dead-end lines in Sandpiper therefore the costs for Chartwell and Sandpiper have been identified separately.

These costs may be recovered through a one-time increase in parcel taxes or by a referendum for a borrowing bylaw. The \$437 per parcel cost assumes all residents in the Chartwell/Sandpiper subdivision contribute to the looping project, not just properties that are on cul-de-sacs.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

A cost estimate has been prepared to loop the dead-end water lines in the FCWLSA. The cost per parcel to loop the existing cul-de-sac lines (but <u>not</u> to replace the existing smaller diameter lines in the cul-de-sacs) is estimated to be \$437. This cost would apply to all parcels in the Chartwell/Sandpiper subdivision, not just the properties located on cul-de-sacs. If undertaken, the looping should improve operation of the system and reduce sedimentation in the lines but at a cost that perhaps not all residents would support. Since the reservoir and pump house upgrades and the alternative groundwater supply study are proceeding, and the results of these initiatives would improve water quality without looping the water lines, staff recommend that they be completed first and the need to loop the waterlines be reassessed at that time.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That this report be received for information.
- 2. That staff continue with the alternative groundwater supply study and report back to the Board.

Amendment to Rates and Regulation ByLaw No. 1172

PROBLEM

Due to significant lower than average water consumption in the San Pareil Water Local Service Area in 2002, revenues are lower than projected. The current parcel tax/user rate structures will not sustain the required operating budget in 2003

BACKGROUND

The current rates and regulation bylaw for the San Pareil Water Supply Local Service Area, Bylaw 1172.01, was adopted in February 2002. The initial billing for 2002 was a flat rate for January 2002 to May 15, 2002 and the second billing for the period of May 15 to September 15 was a metered rate based on a five step, inclined block rate structure. The flat rate charged for the first part of 2002 was based on the previous flat rates for 2000 and 2001, and was \$203.95. The summer (May 15 to September 15) rate structure was based on summer 2001 water records, which showed the average water consumption in San Pareil for this period to be 1.79 m³/day/residence (394 Igpd). Prior to 2002 the revenue collected for San Pareil was based on a parcel tax and two flat rate billings per year for a total annual cost per parcel of about \$541.00 (excluding 10% early payment discount).

To establish the rates in the current bylaw, revenue for 2002 was forecast as follows:

- January to May flat rate billing for 264 connections: total \$53,843.00.
- May to September summer billing for 264 connections based on average consumption in 2001; projected total \$57,317.00.
- Total billing for 2002 was estimated at \$111,160.00.

Prior to summer 2002, staff informed the residents of the pending 5 step metered rate structure and that metered water rates would be implemented (consistent with all water systems owned by the RDN).

In September of 2002 staff read the water meters in San Pareil. The average water consumption for the summer of 2002 was down 33% from the previous summer, from an average of 1.79 m³/d to 1.19 m³/d. This drop in average water consumption reduced the summer revenue from an anticipated \$57,317.00 to \$28,928.00.

To ensure adequate revenue in 2003 the parcel tax and user rates must be adjusted accordingly. Staff has reviewed the 2002 data and the 2003 provisional operating budget and is recommending a revision to the parcel tax and to the user rates to balance the 2003 budget. Consideration can be given to reducing parcel taxes and user rates in future budgets if revenues prove sufficient to support the budget.

Total revenue for San Pareil in 2003 is estimated at just over \$165,000.00, comprised of parcel taxes, user fees and surplus from the previous year. Initially, parcel taxes were projected at just over \$40,000 with user fees in the order of \$113,000.00 and surplus at just over \$12,000.00. It is now apparent that user fees in 2003 will not reach the projection. Based on estimated user rates for the fall 2002 to spring 2003 and the summer 2003 billing periods (assuming similar water consumption as in the summer 2002), a shortfall in revenue is projected. Factors contributing to this revenue shortfall are the residents' water conservation practices and in some cases possibly the use of private wells for irrigation. Although the San Pareil residents' reduced water consumption is a significant contribution to water conservation and protection of the resource, there is a minimum revenue level for the system that must be sustained through taxes and user fees.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Amend Bylaw 1172.02 as recommended and adjust the 2003 provisional budget to reflect a water local service area parcel tax for San Pareil of \$210 per parcel.
- Provide alternative direction to increase revenues for 2003.

So in 2003, a home in San Pareil with average water consumption will pay a parcel tax of \$210.00, a flat water rate of \$176.00 (less 10% if paid early) and an estimated metered rate of \$207.00 (based on summer of 2002 @ 1.19m3/day and less 10% if paid early). When early payment credits are considered, an average home in San Pareil in 2003 will pay approximately \$553.00, compared to about \$501.00 prior to the introduction of metered rates.

For comparative purposes, in the "November 20, 1999 Information Package" leading up to the San Pareil Water Referendum, the following information was provided to residents:

With the proposed parcel tax and user rates for 2003 estimated at \$553.00, the total fee for 2003 will be as forecast in the 1999 literature. If and as future improvements to the system are required, parcel taxes may have to be adjusted further.

Revenue for the water system is collected through parcel taxes and user fees. In 2003 total revenue from parcel taxes and user fees for the San Pareil Water Local Service Area must be in the order of \$153,000.00. To achieve this, parcel taxes in 2003 should be increased to \$210.00/parcel and user fees adjusted according to Bylaw 1172.02.

Total revenue collected in 2003 from parcel tax will be \$60,480.00 and water revenue (after discounts and based on average water consumption) will be \$92,600.00 for a total of about \$153,000.00. This revenue should be sufficient to sustain the 2003 San Pareil budget.

CITIZENS/PUBLIC RELATIONS IMPLICATIONS

Parcel taxes and user fees in 2003 must increase. If the report recommendations are accepted, the total cost per connected property will be approximately \$553.00 (an average water user and applying the 10% early payment discount). Although this will constitute an increase in total fees compared to previous years, the fee compares to the year 2003 figure of \$553.00 quoted to the residents in literature distributed prior to the referendum,

Staff proposes to meet with the San Pareil Owners and Residents Association executive to discuss the necessity of the parcel tax and user fee increases, and coordinate with the executive an information bulletin or meeting to provide the relevant information to San Pareil residents.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

Water consumption in San Pareil in the summer of 2002 was considerably lower than for the same period in 2001. User rate revenue in 2002 is therefore reduced by about \$28,000.00. It is anticipated that water consumption and water revenue may be lower than expected in 2003 and therefore total revenue for 2003 must be generated with increased parcel taxes and user rates. In 2003 parcel taxes should be raised to \$210.00/parcel and user rates increased according to recommended Bylaw 1172.02. Total revenue necessary in 2003 to sustain the San Pareil budget is estimated at \$153,000.00. With the increased parcel taxes and user rates staff forecast total revenue to be just over \$153,000.00.

Total cost per connected parcel in San Pareil in 2003 (average use) will be approximately \$553.00. Although this is an increase of \$155 per parcel over 2002, the increase compares with the information circulated in the 1999 Referendum Information package, which projected 2003 parcel taxes and user fees to be \$553.00/parcel.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That "San Pareil Water Supply Local Service Area Rates and Regulations Amendment Bylaw No. 1172.02, 2002" be introduced and read three times.

Banking services recommendation

PURPOSE:

To report on the results of a request for proposal call for banking services and to recommend a successful proponent.

BACKGROUND:

The Regional District of Nanaimo currently uses the Royal Bank as its provider of banking and supplementary financial services. The existing arrangements expire on December 31st, 2002 and a request for proposal call was initiated this summer. All the major banks and credit unions were solicited directly.

The intent of the proposal call was to obtain a suite of financial services at the least net cost to the Regional District, as well as to ensure that the financial institution was capable of maintaining and enhancing electronic banking opportunities for Regional District customers and departmental staff. For instance, the Regional District now receives an electronic file of customer payments, which can be uploaded directly to our financial software, thereby eliminating staff time for manual data entry of these items. Approximately 50% of annual bill payments are handled in this manner.

The Royal Bank and the Bank of Nova Scotia were the only financial institutions to submit proposals.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. Award a five year contract for banking services to the Royal Bank of Canada as the least cost proponent.
- Make no award and initiate another call for proposal under alternative criteria.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Alternative I

Both proponents offer a comprehensive range of comparable banking services and are capable of maintaining the electronic customer payment interface described above. Staff are quite satisfied with the services and products offered by the Royal Bank. On an overall basis the Royal Bank offers the least net cost for a combination of services and interest paying arrangements.

It is worth commenting that prior to this proposal call, banking services for municipal organizations our size were generally offered at no cost. This is no longer the case. Both the Royal Bank and the Bank of Nova Scotia propose fees for services. Information regarding specific rates and charges is protected under freedom of Information regulations as requested by the proponent. Accordingly a confidential summary of the proposed costs is enclosed under separate cover.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS:

The Regional District's current banking arrangements expire on December 31st, 2002. The Royal Bank of Canada and the Bank of Nova Scotia were the only respondents to a request for proposal. Both proponents offer a comprehensive range of comparable banking services and products and are capable of maintaining the electronic customer payment interfaces, which have been customized for the Regional District. On an overall basis the Royal Bank offers the least net cost for a combination of services and interest paying arrangements. Staff are satisfied with the range of products and services, which have been provided, to date by the Royal Bank and accordingly recommend awarding the Royal Bank a five year contract for banking services.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Royal Bank be awarded a five year contract for banking services as outlined in their proposal submitted August 2002.

SUBJECT: Operating Results to September 30, 2002

PURPOSE

To present a summary of the operating results for the period ending September 30th, 2002.

BACKGROUND

As part of the Regional District's commitment to accountability, staff prepare quarterly operating statements. The statement attached to this report covers the period January 1 to September 30, 2002 and is prepared primarily on a 'cash paid' basis except for debt and property taxes, which are accrued monthly.

The relative proportion of revenues and expenditures to date should be approximately 75% of the budgeted amounts for the year. The actual results show revenues at 81% and expenditures at 68% of budget. Revenues are ahead of target because user fees for the year have now been billed and building permit fees are higher than anticipated. Expenditures typically vary considerably throughout the year, with some significant costs, particularly capital expenses and professional fees, often paid later in the fiscal period. Such costs may be committed or in progress but not paid until later in the year.

On an overall basis the attached statement shows that wages (76%), administration costs (73%), and debt financing costs (75%) are approximately equal to the benchmark percentage. Professional fees (44%), building operations and maintenance (42%) and capital expenditures (28%) are lower due to either the timing issues noted above or to projects being carried forward to the next year.

Corporate Services

Overall Corporate Services budgets are within the expected range for revenues and expenditures. Grant and operating revenues are at 73% of budget. Community grants (47%) are low in part because the Gabriola Island Library lease grant has not yet been paid out. Professional fees (16%) and building operations and maintenance (18%) are below the 75% benchmark due to timing. For example, certain expenses related to the administration building renovation have not yet been incurred. Transfers to the reserve fund (103%) have been completed for the year. The Nanoose Bay Fire Protection function transferred an additional \$5,000 to reserves from the proceeds of a sale of a fire truck. Total expenses for Corporate Services to date are 70% of budget.



Community Services

Overall Community Services budgets are within the expected range for revenues (77%)and expenditures (75%). Overall operating and grant revenues for Transit are 77% of budget, while those for the D69 Arena, D69 Recreation Coordination and the Ravensong Aquatic Center are 68%, 93% and 78% respectively.

Capital expenditures (22%) are low to this point pending the completion of Regional Park trail and bridge projects. As reported in the last edition of the Regional Perspectives, the Arrowsmith Trail and Haslam Creek bridge projects will be completed this year. These two projects are budgeted at \$121,000, Some Community Parks capital initiatives are on hold pending grant funding from other levels of government or outside sources. Certain capital items are budgeted to be completed over two years with funds to be carried forward to 2003. These include the steam room and sauna for the aquatic center (total \$100,000; 2002 \$56,500). The arena roofing and humidifier projects have been deferred due to the pending move to a new facility next year. Approximately \$13,000 of the community and youth program grants (57%) budget is expected to be carried over to the next year. Transfers to other agencies (98%) are recorded for the year. Professional fees (80%) are higher than the benchmark due mostly to work related to the Growth Management Plan review and the multiplex referendum being complete at this date.

Development Services

Development Services revenues (94%) are higher than budget expectations, partly as a result of receiving certain planning grants earlier in the year and better than anticipated Building Inspection permit fees (129%), Planning permit fees (143%) and subdivision application fees (190%). These are well above budget due to increased construction levels in the Regional District. Permit activity is continuing at a higher than normal pace.

Total expenses for Development Services to date are 64% of budget, with professional fees (44%), equipment operating (27%) and capital expenditures (46%) lower than the benchmark due to timing. Vehicle operations and maintenance expenses (92%) are high because vehicle insurance has been paid for the full year.

Environmental Services

Overall operating/grant revenues are at 84% of budget for Environmental Services. Year to date revenues now include substantially all of the 2002 billings for sewer, water, garbage collection and recycling services. Solid waste tipping fee revenue is a healthy 80% of budget. Wastewater treatment septage receiving fees are at 99% of budget for the Southern Community and 59% for the Northern Community. Septage fee revenues at the French Creek treatment plant are forecast at \$174,000 versus the budget expectation of \$220,000. Monthly revenues appear to have stabilized at an average of \$15,000 and the 2003 provisional budget reflects this lower expectation.

Total expenses for Environmental Services are 62% of budget with professional fees (48%), vehicle operations and maintenance (52%) and building operations and maintenance (40%) lower than the 75% benchmark, once again due to timing. Capital costs (24%) are also low, in large part due to the Southern Community wastewater treatment plant projects. It is expected that approximately half of this budget will need to be carried over for completion in 2003.



SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

The attached summary includes operating activities recorded up to September 30, 2002. Overall, the Regional District has collected 81% of total budgeted revenues, including 80% of grants and operating revenues, and has incurred 68% of the annual budgeted expenditures. The lower expenditures reflect the fact that some budgeted professional fees and capital expenditures will either be paid later in the year or deferred until next year.

Regional Parks Budget Reduction Scenarios

PURPOSE

To provide information on alternative scenarios and municipal and electoral area impacts for a regional parks budget tax requisition reduction.

BACKGROUND

At the October 22, 2002 Committee of the Whole meeting, the following resolution was passed:

THAT the Regional Parks requisition be reduced from \$400,000 to \$350,000, to be phased back in to \$400,000 in 2004.

THAT this item be referred to staff and a report prepared for the Board which reflects the effect of this budget reduction on all electoral areas and municipalities.

The March 13, 2001 Regional Parks Services Agreement indicates that the annual costs of operation and maintenance of regional parks shall be shared on a proportionate basis (based on population) among Nanaimo, Parksville, Qualicum Beach and each Electoral Area. It further specifies that the Regional District shall consult with the Municipalities with respect to the planning and coordination of future regional parks and trails acquisition and development.

As part of the Regional Services Review discussions, the regional parks funding approach provided for the electoral areas to maintain and fund a parks acquisition program. The municipalities would play a role in assisting with the operational and maintenance costs of the regional parks system.

One alternative is to maintain that funding approach in 2003 as has been reflected in the proposed 2003 provisional budget.

Two other alternative funding scenarios have been developed that would reduce the requisition and impact the funding allocation between the electoral areas and the municipalities.

ALTERNATIVES

1. That the proposed \$400,000 requisition for regional parks be retained with the municipalities and electoral areas sharing operational costs and the electoral areas covering reserve or acquisition costs.

The proposed 2003 provisional budget provides for a \$400,000 requisition that has \$250,000 to support operational activities and \$150,000 for acquisition obligations in 2003 and future initiative

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- 2. Reduce the requisition by \$50,000 to \$350,000 with a \$250,000 operations budget and a \$100,000 acquisition budget to reduce the electoral areas contribution to the function.
- 3. Reduce the requisition by \$50,000 in proportion to the 2003 proposed provisional budget allocation between operations and acquisitions.

This would result in reduced contributions from both the municipalities and the electoral areas. It would also require that certain proposed activities in the operating side of the budget for 2003 to support park and tail planning and development and the two campground businesses be deleted to reflect the reduction from \$250,000 to \$216,667. Otherwise the budget would have a \$20,273 deficit.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

A chart of the proposed and alternative budget scenarios with the jurisdictional impacts is outlined below:

SUMMARY

Alternative funding scenarios for the regional parks function have been developed. One provides for a \$400,000 requisition with funding for operations shared between the electoral areas and the municipalities and funding for acquisitions handled by the electoral areas. The other two alternatives provide for a reduction of the requisition to \$350,000 with one having \$50,000 less funding to acquisitions that provides a savings to the electoral areas. The third alternative redistributes the savings from the \$50,000 reduction between the municipalities and the electoral areas in proportion to the budget split between operations and acquisitions.

Based on the Regional Parks Service Agreement and the administrative understanding of the funding approach, which was discussed at this time of the Regional Services Review, staff are recommending Alternative 1.

RECOMMENDATION

That the proposed \$400,000 requisition for regional parks in 2003 be retained with the municipalities and electoral areas sharing operational costs and the electoral areas covering reserve or acquisition costs.

Multiplex financing and 2003 budget

PURPOSE:

To report on the effect of using 2003 property taxes for the multiplex to reduce the amount required under long term borrowing.

BACKGROUND:

The proposed 2003 budget for the District 69 Arena function provides for \$160,400 for interim financing costs and \$70,175 for debt issuing costs related to the multiplex. Staff anticipate completing a spring 2004 borrowing which would require that a further \$70,175 for debt issuing costs and a full year's debt payment of about \$694,000 be included in the 2004 budget.

The Board has asked for information on two questions regarding the timing of raising taxes for the multiplex debt:

- I. What savings would accrue if additional taxes were raised in 2003, and the funds were applied to cover project costs in 2003. (i.e. do not borrow the equivalent amount)
- 2. What effect would there be on the term of the debt if taxes were raised at the \$17.69/\$100,000 rate based on using 2003 taxes to cover some of the project costs.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. Make no changes to the 2003 Provisional budget which raises \$710,265 and provides for borrowing \$8,120,000 in 2004 for a period of 25 years. The 2003 cost for this option is estimated at \$5.70 per \$100,000. The cost after 2003 is estimated at \$16.90 per \$100,000.
- Increase the 2003 tax requisition to \$962,030 to allow approximately \$482,000 to be applied
 against the multiplex costs and borrow the remainder over 25 years. The 2003 cost for this option
 is estimated at \$12.00 per \$100,000. The cost after 2003 for this option is estimated at \$15.90 per
 \$100,000.

- 3. Increase the 2003 tax requisition to \$1,200,000 to allow approximately \$694,000 to be applied against the multiplex costs and borrow the remainder over 25 years. The 2003 cost for this option is estimated at \$17.20 per \$100,000. The cost after 2003 for this option is estimated at \$15.50 per \$100,000.
- 4. Increase the 2003 tax requisition to \$962,030 to allow approximately \$482,000 to be applied against the multiplex costs and borrow the remainder over 20 years. The 2003 cost for this option is estimated at \$12.00 per \$100,000. The cost after 2003 for this option is estimated at \$17.70 per \$100,000.
- 5. Increase the 2003 tax requisition to \$1,200,000 to allow approximately \$694,000 to be applied against the multiplex costs and borrow the remainder over 20 years. The 2003 cost for this option is estimated at \$17.20 per \$100,000. The cost after 2003 for this option is estimated at \$17.20 per \$100,000.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

In response to the first question, staff at the October 15th budget meeting staff outlined the following:

In response to the second question staff have confirmed that by reducing the amount borrowed, it is possible to reduce the term of the repayment from 25 years to 20 years at about the same cost as originally forecast during the multiplex referendum. Staff notes that with 2002 assessment information in hand, the current tax cost per \$100,000 for the multiplex debt is estimated at \$16.90 versus the \$17.69 forecast during the referendum. The impacts of borrowing over a 20 year period are shown in the table below:

The table above shows that while the annual cost for a 20 year debt repayment would be as much as \$75,430 higher than a 25 year debt repayment, much of the additional cost is absorbed by new construction and market related assessment growth. Substantial savings can be achieved by reducing the debt from 25 years to 20 years regardless of the amount borrowed.

On a slightly conservative note, fixing the long term debt payment at the maximum tax rate available reduces budget room, which might otherwise be available to fund alternative service levels for the multiplex operations.



SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS:

The Board requested information regarding the effects of raising a full years property taxes for the new multiplex with an eye to subsequently reducing both the total amount borrowed and the final term for the long term debt. This report outlines the savings that would be achieved either by borrowing tess or by shortening the term of the debt. The referendum question regarding borrowing for the multiplex sought elector assent to borrow \$8,120,000 over a 25 year term – this is the approval given through the referendum result. Staff accordingly recommend no changes to the provisional budget as presented.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the District 69 Arena 2003 provisional budget which raises \$710,265 and provides for borrowing \$8,120,000 in 2004 for a period of 25 years be approved.

PURPOSE:

To introduce for three readings and adoption "Regional District of Nanaimo 2003 Provisional Budget Bylaw No. 1327, 2002".

BACKGROUND:

The Board has received staff presentations of the 2003 Provisional budget over the course of two meetings schedule on October 15th and October 22nd, 2002. The following amendments have been recommended to date:

- 1. Reduction in tax requisition for Area E Community Park from \$85,000 to \$50,000
- 2. Reduction in tax requisition and community grant funds in D69 Recreation Coordination budget of \$40,000
- Addition of \$135 for one additional intersection streetlight in the Highway #4 streetlighting function
- 4. Addition of \$100 to the Electoral Areas budget to provide for the purchase of a Remembrance day wreath in Electoral Area D

Property taxes have been adjusted accordingly from \$21,026,450 to \$20,951,450. The Provisional budget must be adopted by bylaw and Bylaw 1327 is attached for this purpose.

ALTERNATIVES:

- I. Adopt the provisional budget as presented herein.
- Make further amendments to the provisional budget and adopt it as amended.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The reductions noted above have reduced the year over year increases to the City of Parksville, the Town of Qualicum Beach and Electoral Areas E, F, G and H as follows:
